Welcome and Introductions

- Public Health Update
 - o There is a pause on the Jansen vaccine. Providers are not restricted from using it and can use their discretion but for the time being, until a further review is conducted, they are recommending a pause. Kings County Health Department has paused all use of Jansen vaccine. There are issues where people can still see appointments available for this vaccine but they are working on fixing that miscommunication. Almost 7 million Jansen vaccines have been administered throughout the US- 6 individuals had severe adverse

reactions. It's not known yet whether these blood clots are attributed to the vaccine. The cases were all women, ages 18-48, with no known cases in CA. Symptoms arose 2 weeks after vaccination. If you have been vaccinated by Jansen within the past 2 weeks, you want to look out for the following symptoms and contact your healthcare provider: severe headache, backache, abdominal pain, shortness of breath, leg swelling, tiny red spots on your skin, new neurological symptoms.

- Priority: Put students first
- The best place for students is full time, in-person, 5 days a week
- Started bringing in students beginning in August
- Transition to phase reopening in November when Kings County was in red tier; followed by a surge in December
- Schools in Kings County are currently open
- "Give power to parents": parents are able to choose between distance learning or returning in person
- As students returned, schools have focused on socio-emotional learning and mental health of their students
- Plans are in motion to extend school year and offer summer school
- Challenges: any school with hybrid model is struggling with social distancing rules
 - Rules changed from 6ft to 3ft
 - Challenge: If every school came back, they couldn't realistically maintain 3ft distance
 - Challenge: If you're within 6ft of a person who tested positive, you have to quarantine for 10 days
- Hanford High is the first school to announce they are planning in-person graduation this year

District Attorney's Office

- National Commission on COVID-19 and Criminal Justice survey found:
 - Violent Crimes, more specifically homicides, was 30% higher in 2020 compared to 2019.
 - This number is far below historic highs
 - Domestic violence rates spiked at start of the pandemic
 - No area in Kings County was involved with this survey's metrics
 - March of last year, jury trials were suspended
 - Speedy trials rights mandated by the constitution outlines time periods for when an individual has a right to a trial
 - Court was concerned about social distancing for jury
 - Court trials without a jury continued
- Prosecutors were able to appear remotely on an app called BlueJeans so that everyone could be "present"
- Carpel- online system that allows any prosecutor, law enforcement officer, etc. to access any case as long as they have internet access
- In October, court cleared jury trials and about one a week has been held.
- *Challenge*: because trials have been suspended, there's quite a backroll.
- Did crime increase during the pandemic? Yes, but due more to systemic issues relating to the pandemic.
 - Price gouging, COVID scams, fraud
 - Started doing presentations and outreach to educate people on these issues

- Some increase in local crime
 - Much greater number of individuals being released from jail or being released sooner
 - o Bail relief to misdemeanor felony cases some people, bail was set at o
 - The Department of Corrections has been releasing "nonviolent inmates" and has been offering additional credits for time served.
- Has seen slight increase in Domestic Violence cases and Child Abuse cases
 - o DV cases: 4% increase
 - Inmates are getting released early and going home and the abuse continues at home
 - Has seen an increase in victims needing services
 - Has seen an increase in anxiety due to cases taking longer to resolve
 - Child abuse cases: 6-7% increase
 - Only cases that are reported but mandated reporters aren't able to report as much with schools being distance learning
- The state is looking at cutting programs and grants (i.e. Victims of Crime Act-VOCA)
- National Crime Victims' Rights Week (April 18-24)
 - In-person memorial quote viewing Thursday April 22nd from 2-7pm @ Hanford First Baptist Church
 - Look out on Facebook for videos and event updates

Question: How can we support policy wise in regards to making our voices heard that we do NOT want these programs and grants cut?

A lot of the funding is decided by OES which has public meetings with public comments at the beginning of the meetings. Sending a letter to your representative, letting your voice be heard-these meetings are all online.

Behavioral Impact

Champions

- Unfortunately there are not a lot of stats for substance use, especially during COVID since a lot for drug testing done by treatment centers and law enforcement programs (ie. probation and parole) has stopped. Parole hasn't drug tested individuals on their caseload in a year.
- General Community Observations:
 - o COVID shutdown a lot of out-patient services temporarily
 - Very few organizations were prepared to do telehealth
 - Took about a month to do transition to online platform
 - Face-to-face meetings was providing a lot of structure and accountability but moving to telehealth services created disconnect
 - A lot of support groups in the community stopped meeting
 - People who were doing sponsorships and relied in engagement lost that service
 - Lack of accountability due to law enforcement agencies not able to drug test for a period of time
 - Instances of individuals being sent to the jail temporary/ using "sobering cells" decreased since only individuals categorized as "most dangerous to the community" were kept in the system

- Individuals used to go through withdrawal symptoms and would then work with Champions after that period whereas now, without that jail option, clients are going to Champions in the middle of their withdrawals
- See a decrease in referrals because of lack of accountability from law enforcement agencies
- Emergency department did not see severe increase in # of cases but they did see an increase in addiction medicine services wanted from clients over telehealth
- Project Roomkey helped individuals who had substance use issues receive services and shelter
- Champions observations
 - Had a significant decrease in funding for adult treatments
 - Reduced # of clients seen for services at residential treatment centers
 - In July 2020, waitlist for outpatient program significantly increased (wait time around 4-6months)
 - Shortage of drug counselors
 - For outpatient programs, were unable to do drug testing for a period of time due to close contact liability
 - Will be reopening drug testing and making it mandatory to maintain accountability

Question: When it comes to the outpatient waitlist, what do you see in the future and how can we support you?

Started contracting directly to serve parolees. Able to provide services to individuals with Medi-Cal through funding provided by Behavioral Health. For individuals who may not have Medi-Cal, Champions is looking at working with private insurance and being able to bill to them. Is negotiating a contract with the Human Services Agency to serve their clients.

Question: Do you believe the addition of telehealth to future processes is a positive? Yes- The funding that allows for outpatient services restricts these services to be given out from their Hanford office. Telehealth has given them a bigger reach in the community. Will continue Telehealth services after the pandemic. Difficulties with telehealth: lack of bandwidth to connect for video calls. Clients can still call over the phone if internet connection doesn't work.

Question: Were any of the houses under Champions closed during the funding cuts? No- both women and men houses did not close. Last year, began providing a permanent support housing program for chronic homeless individuals in the community.
