Healthy Eating

Darcy Pickens, Board Member

- Healthy Retail-Storefront Campaign, working to reduce advertising of unhealthy items (i.e. tobacco, alcohol, sodas) and promote healthy food choices
- Working on an award criteria and a menu of options for stores to choose from
- Agencies represented in this group are KCAO, UCCE, WIC, Tobacco Program through Kings Co. Health Dept. and California Health Collaborative
- Working on a pilot campaign in Avenal
- Working to partner with Chamber of Commerce to present awards and promote participating stores
- KPFP is responsible for the media effort.
- Working on a more robust CNAP. First half of meetings will be CNAP and second half will be Healthy Retail

- Looking for partners who represent homeless population and senior citizens, anyone interested in helping us come up with a nutrition plan
- Debra Wood explained CNAP-Community Nutrition Action Plan
- Healthy Retail reward will be built into the CNAP
- Would like to partner more with Active Living group to incorporate Healthy Living into Healthy Workplace Plan
- Healthy Retail reward criteria will be posted on KPFP website

- Revised mission and vision. 3 primary responsibilities: assess what's going on in the community, develop policies, promote policies, enforce policies, and provide assurance to the community
- Debbie explained the organizational chart as well as an overview of each department

#### o Presentations and Discussion

- Community Regional Trauma Program Kings County Data Eliana Troncale, Injury Prevention Outreach Specialist
  - Only comprehensive Burn Center in the Central Valley
  - Comprehensive Cancer Center Cyber Knife was first tried at CRMC
  - Central California Neuro Suppliant Institute
  - Level 3 Neonatal Intensive Care Unit
  - Level 1 Trauma Center Highest level
  - Provides Injury Prevention Education
  - Ongoing research in every specialty
  - Busiest trauma center in California
  - Over 3,000 patients admitted per year, over 6,000 seen in the emergency room per year
  - CRMC is a non-profit hospital all patients get the care they need regardless of insurance

- CA PREP *Monica Gomez-Nordberg, California Health Collaborative* (California Personal Responsibility Education Program)
  - Purpose of this program is to reduce teen pregnancy and STI's, including HIV and STD's in Kings County
  - Provides evidence based curriculum to Kings County youth
  - Working in various schools in Kings County
  - Focuses on High Risk Teens
  - Teen Pregnancy/Birth Rates for the Central Valley and California as a whole, have declined substantially
  - The U.S. ranks at the bottom when compared to other developed countries who have a much lower rate of teen pregnancies
  - This program will be ending soon as they did not receive the grant which funds it
- Central Valley Suicide Prevention Hotline (handouts)

Barbara Breen, Kings View

- Began in 2013
- Operates 24 hours a day/7 days a week
- Nationally Accredited within 6 months of being 24/7
- Accreditation provides affiliation with National Suicide Prevention Lifeline
- Through affiliation, calls from 559 and 209 area codes are routed to our call center
- Translated in 150 languages
- Over 50% of calls are men Men typically won't burden friends or family members
- Confidential & safe
- Call responders listen & hear, helping to deescalate the person and discuss safety plans
- Explore triggers and coping mechanisms, work on immediate safety plan as well as a long term plan with individuals
- Follow up phone calls, help with resources, and continued follow up until individual has a routine
- Outcome is a win-win; resulting in saved lives, as well as cost savings in regards to emergency services
